Due to the standard of living below the poverty line, linguistic problem, temporary residential places are forcing the migrated, famlies to neglect their children's education. The elder children especially girls are forced to take care of their younger sisters and brothers.

has developed. So they with interest and involvement enrol their children in the special school. On seeing their children's academc performance they enjoy immeasureable pleasure. Our day care centres for the babies of the migrated families is also one of the reasons for their willingness to send the children to the special school.

These migrated people have never cared about their health and hygiene conditions because they are residing along the high way platforms or nearby unhealthy construction sites where they are employed.

Due to our prolonged efforts now these migrated people have atlast realized the necessity to take care of health and hygiene and began to go to Government hospitals to get relief for their children's sickness.

II. Following are the important activities implemented during the reporting period.

Started a special school for the migrated children.

- Appointed teachers and imparted training to them.
- Identified and enrolled all the children who had attained the school going age.
- Organised periodical evaluation tests and examinations.
- Participated in inter-school sports competition.
- Organised a residential training camp at a nearby village.
- Began day-care centre for the babies.
- Organised Medical Camps and offered medicines and vitamin tonics to the needy.
- Purchased and distributed school uniforms to the students.
- Prepared and offered nutritious food to the students.
- Organised networking programmes and participated in the programmes organised by other like minded NGOs.
- Organized monthly staff meetings.
